Harpers Ferry in Jefferson County, West Virginia — *The American South (Appalachia)*

Floods

Inscription. ◆ Waterpower built this town, and the power of the water eventually destroyed it.

The destruction of the Federal Armory during the Civil War began the town's decline. Many people who had left Harpers Ferry during the war did return, only to be driven away again - and this time permanently - by the devastating flood of 1870 and those that soon followed. Harpers Ferry never fully recovered.



1. Floods Marker

Topics. This historical marker is listed in this topic list: <u>Disasters</u>. A significant historical year for this entry is 1870.

Location. 39° 19.337′ N, 77° 43.838′ W. Marker is in Harpers Ferry, West Virginia, in Jefferson County. It is at the intersection of Shenandoah Street (Business U.S. 340) and Market Street, on the right when traveling east on Shenandoah Street. Marker is in the Lower Town at Harpers Ferry National Historical Park. <u>Touch for map</u>. Marker is in this post office area: Harpers Ferry WV 25425, United States of America. 
